

### Pain - limited inclusivity in EIC programmes

Pathfinder


 Widening countries receive 8,5% of the total EIC Pathfinder funding.

Accelerator
Short applications (Step 1)

- The level of applications from widening countries = **18% of the total** (7852).
- Success rate = over 50% (slightly below average).


Accelerator
Full Applications (Step 2 & 3)

- Despite some improvement (11% in 2021 to 14% in 2022), there's a considerable gap.
- Success rate well below the average (5.1% compared to the 8% average).





#### Common shortcomings in project proposals

#### Vague or unclear:


- Vague or unclear project proposals.
- Ignoring evaluation criteria.
- Deviation from specified guidelines.
- Overly technical or jargon-heavy text in the application.

#### Risk and budget:

- Missing or incomplete identification of potential risks.
- Absence of clear budget justification.

#### Time management:

- "Last-minute" work.
- No proofreading either "pre-screening."



- Great work! Now the problem seems highly complex in a way that we, and only we, can solve.





## Proposal Submission "Don'ts"

Don't skip the review	Before hitting upload, double-check and get someone else to review. Errors can slip through easily.
Avoid forgetting story-telling	EIC evaluators appreciate a compelling story. Don't just list details but weave them into a narrative for impact.
Humans read your proposal	Remember, evaluators are people too. Make your proposal easy to read and understand.
Don't overcrowd with words	A picture is worth a thousand words. Don't overwhelm with text; use visuals to enhance your message.
First impressions matter	A well-presented proposal makes a strong first impression. Capture the evaluator's attention from the start for a higher chance of a second look.

#### What is indicated by EIC Pathfinder experts?

**Technology description**: unclear technology, incomplete state-of-theart, and insufficient breakthrough presentation.

**Science-to-technology breakthrough:** lack of ambition, vague objectives, and no high-risk/high-gain approach.

**Environmental and social impact:** missing measurable KPIs and inadequate description of barriers.

**Exploitation and commercialization:** brief strategies without sufficient details.

**Communication and dissemination:** lack of quantifiable KPIs and specifics for post-project communication.

**Resource allocation and project Management:** inadequate task descriptions affecting resources and unclear project management efforts.





#### What is indicated by EIC Accelerator experts?

#### Market impact and business model:

- Unclear market impact on potential challenges.
- Unconvincing added value with vague comparisons to existing models.
- Insufficient proof for creating new markets.
- Vague timing discussions without factual support or market references.
- Undefined scale-up potential.
- Lack of concrete strategies for market entry and customer attraction.

#### **Budget and Funding:**

- Incomplete or inaccurate budget, overly ambitious, and broadly defined.
- Deemed insufficient requested funds.

#### **Team and Diversity:**

- Lack of clarity on team members and competencies.
- Absence of a clear gender balance strategy.





### The solution

**Effective project writing** is key to getting support and bringing innovative ideas to life



- **1. EIC Work programme.** Check out the main plan to really understand what's expected >>>
- 2. Official guidance document (e.g. Guide for applicants). Follow the rules >>>
- **3. FAQs: your new best friends**. Read through questions others asked and ask your own through Research Enquiry Service >>>
- **4. Infoday material is gold**. Grab info from presentation slides, documents, and Q&A sessions >>>
- **5. Peek at the applications template.** Take a look at the template to know how to structure your proposal >>>
- **6. Check out past success stories**. See what worked before on CORDIS, especially if mentioned in infoday >>>
- **7.** Understand the evaluation stuff. Know what they're looking for to improve your chances >>>

# EIC Pathfinder: DOS



**Scientific excellence:** Showcase top-notch research, emphasizing the excellence and originality of your proposed approach.



**Interdisciplinary collaboration:** Showcase how collaboration enhances innovation across fields.



**High-risk, high-reward challenges:** Highlight how your project tackles challenging scientific questions, emphasizing potential breakthroughs.



**Societal and ethical considerations:** Discuss the societal and ethical aspects, addressing risks and showing commitment to responsible research.



**Long-term impact:** Clearly explain your big picture plans, detailing how your research could lead to lasting advancements and applications in the future.





# EIC Accelerator: DOS



**Define innovation clearly:** Explain how your project improves on existing solutions for a specific market need.



**Focus on impact:** Highlight the economic, societal, and environmental benefits of your project.



**Show expertise:** Ensure each team member brings unique skills and resources.



**Build a solid business plan:** Develop a comprehensive plan for commercialization, including market analysis and financial projections.



**Ensure scalability:** Demonstrate how your project can become a sustainable business, emphasizing potential follow-up funding and collaborations.








# Why now?


